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Kunja Puri Temple

Kunjaburi Devi Temple is sacred temple of immense importance in Hindu religion. Located at an height of 1676 meters on a hill, Kunjaburi Devi Temple is one of the 52 Shaktipeeth in Uttarakhand. Here at Kunjaburi Devi Temple, the chest of burnt Sati had fallen. Kunjaburi Devi Temple also offers panoramic views of snow capped mountains and peaks such as Swarga Rohini, Gangotri, Banderpunch and Chaukhamba.



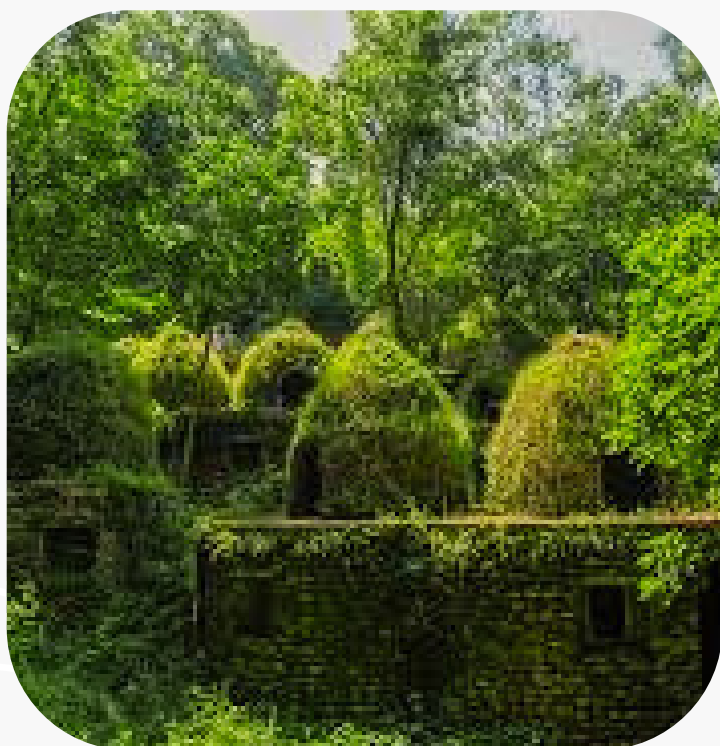
Parmarth Niketan

This is one of the top yoga centres in India and the largest ashram in the area, located on the banks of the holy Ganges River. It has blossomed over 70 years of its existence into Rishikesh's largest ashram. The ashram was founded by Swami Shukdevanand Saraswati in 1942. It is open to all, without discrimination based on race, gender, nationality, religion, caste, or creed. Ashram is famous for its Hawan on the Ghat of Parmarth and for its Ganga Arati, which takes place daily in the morning and evening.



Triveni Ghat

Located on the sacred banks of the Ganga River in Rishikesh, Triveni Ghat is a symbol of spiritual sanctity and cultural significance. It is famous for being the spot where three of India's most sacred rivers—Ganga, Yamuna, and Saraswati—meet, drawing thousands of pilgrims, tourists, and seekers to its tranquil shores. According to ancient beliefs, this sacred site has the power to cleanse sins and grant salvation to those who take a dip in the holy waters of the Ganga.



Beatles Ashram

In February 1968, the Beatles visited the Maharishi Mahesh Yogi's ashram A.K.A Beatles Ashram in Rishikesh, attracted by his Transcendental Meditation. The Beatles composed numerous songs during their time at the ashram, many of which appear on the band's self-titled double album, also known as the "White Album". Since then numerous travelers have journeyed to Rishikesh as Yoga spread around the globe.



Uttarkashi (Kashi Vishvanath Temple/Shakti Temple)

Uttarkashi is situated at a distance of 154 kilometres from Rishikesh, on the Rishikesh-Gangotri route. The Viswanath Temple is the most important and ancient holy shrine in this region. Of the many temples in Uttarkashi, the temple of Lord Vishwanath is unrivalled in importance. Shiva, the presiding deity of this temple, is worshipped all day here. Every evening, visitors are greeted by the sound of bells, and the chanting of mantras by pundits at the puja.

Within the courtyard of the Vishwanath temple, and to the front of it, is the Shakti Temple, dedicated to the goddess of strength. The massive brass trident projecting from this temple bears an inscription describing how the Vishwanath Temple was built. According to it, the temple was built by King Ganeshwar, whose son Guh, a great warrior, built the trident. 26 feet high, this trident's base measures 8 feet 9 inches, and its top, 18' 2 inches in circumference. The town of Gopeshwar also features a Shiva Temple and a trident with Sanskrit inscriptions. It is much smaller.



Gangotri

Gangotri, the origin of the River Ganges and seat of the goddess Ganga, is one of the four sites in the Char Dham pilgrimage of Uttarakhand. The river is called Bhagirathi at the source and acquires the name Ganga (the Ganges) from Devprayag onwards where it meets the Alaknanda. The origin of the holy river is at Gomukh, set in the Gangotri Glacier, and is a 19 km trek from Gangotri.



Gomukh

Gomukh is the source of the Bhagirathi River in Gangotri Glacier, one of the primary headstreams of the Ganges River. The place is situated at a height of 13,200 ft (4,023 m) in Uttarkashi district.
